PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven." **Ecclesiastes 3:1**

Endings and beginnings. Goodbyes and hellos. Pulling up roots and sending new ones down into the soil. Summer is 24 a good time for this. The rhythm of nature can give us a model for this time of transition. As we get to know each other, we can trust that God will provide time and space $_{10}^{8-9}$ for holy conversations. We can trust that although much is unknown, God intends for us to grow in grace and love for 23-25 one another. Summer is wildly busy for some households. For others it is a break from the daily patterns during the 20 rest of the year. Therefore, we will get to know each other at different rates according to the availability of each of you. Many of you read the brief biography that was in the newsletter before I came for the Meet & Greet in April. Yet, as I begin my time as your pastor, I want to share a bit more about myself. BIOGRAPHY.

I was baptized at Augustana Lutheran Church in Underwood, North Dakota, where my father had been baptized as an adult. My full name is Darla Ann Rachel Kratzer. I have four siblings. They live in Tucson, Houston, Kansas City, and Bemidji, Minnesota. My mother is retired and lives in Fergus Falls, Minnesota. Although I was born in North Dakota and lived in several states as a child, I was raised primarily in the Kansas City area. I have a B.A. in chemistry from a college of the Lutheran Church (Bethany in Kansas). After college, I worked in a hospital hematology and chemistry lab. After three years, I moved to Iowa City to do research work in biochemistry. While in Iowa City, I discovered God was calling me to become a pastor. It was also during this time that I married Tom and our son, Nate, was born. After Tom completed his doctorate, we moved to Chicago where I attended the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, graduating in June 1996. He was a professor at Roosevelt University in Chicago during those years. We moved to Ohio in the summer of 1997 and my husband began his work in the School of Business at Malone University. A year later I was ordained after receiving my first Call from a congregation. I served a total of five different congregations during the 21 years I was in Ohio. A few years ago, my husband entered seminary and the candidacy process in answer to God's call. He was ordained last summer and serves as a pastor of the Wartburg Parish in Southern Illinois. We have one son, Nate, who lives in Louisville, Kentucky with his three-year-old daughter, Raley.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS.

What shall I call you? I prefer Pastor Darla Ann. (Please note: If that is difficult, I suggest "Pastor Dar" or "Pastor D".)

Where do you live? My husband and I bought a house in the Rolling Meadows neighborhood in Maryville.

What will you do first? I will concentrate on becoming acquainted with the members of the congregation and the community of Maryville.

How do you feel about worship? Worship is the most important activity for the people of God. It is the center of our life together as a congregation. In worship we have the privilege of praising and thanking God. As we worship, we engage in a concentrated experience of several of the fundamental practices of the faith. In doing that we are challenged to become a part of God's mission in the world. Through Word and Sacrament we are fed by God and strengthened for our ministries during the coming week.

What is a sermon for you? The sermon is an opportunity to let the word of God speak to our world, our concerns, our joy, sorrows, challenges and sins. Preaching sets our life stories into a larger story. It allows us to see where human events connect with God's purpose and astonishing love.

MORE QUESTIONS.

How do you prepare for a sermon? The discipline of sermon preparation takes about 8 hours each week. Throughout the week I ask questions, read critical commentaries, and explore the connections between the biblical texts and the things that are going on in our life as a congregation, in the world, and in your lives as you share them with me. Preaching is a conversation in which you are my partners. When I am working on the sermon, I take you with me into the Pastor's Study. The sermon that you hear on Sunday morning is the fruit of the conversation that took place throughout the week. It is God's word to us in this time and place.

How long are your sermons? Usually 12 minutes, but they may be between 9 and 15 minutes in length.



What do you think about our relationship with the synod and the church-at-large? I am always eager to be supportive and involved at both these levels. We are a part of the whole people of God.

Will you have regular office hours? Yes, as far as possible. I will usually be in the office from 9:00 a.m. to noon Tuesday through Thursday and on Thursday afternoons from 4 pm -6 pm. Changes or additional hours will be published in the weekly bulletin. I am available at other times by appointment and am happy to visit with you in your homes or at a coffee shop during the afternoons.

Can I "drop in" at the church to see you? Yes, please stop in "to just talk." But if you are coming for a specific reason, it might be good to call ahead so you're not disappointed by finding me meeting with someone else.

Can I call you at any time in the case of an emergency? Yes, call me (or have someone call me) at 330-244-7963 as soon as possible after an emergency. If I'm not available, leave a message on the answering machine and I will respond as soon as possible. If I'm out of town, there will be emergency coverage through an area pastor.

Do you text message? Yes, texting has its advantages so please feel free to use that mode of communication for brief messages and questions. Email at pastor@ourlords.org can be used for longer communication and complex questions.

Will you take a day off? Yes, having time for rest and renewal is part of the rhythm God intends for all human beings for our health and well-being. During these first few months, I will be taking Mondays off (with the exception of attending the monthly Monday evening Steering Team and Council meetings). I do appreciate receiving only emergency calls on my day off.

FINAL QUESTIONS

What do you do to relax? I enjoy walking and biking with my husband. I enjoy taking classes for Line Dancing and Cardio Kick-boxing. Listening to music, reading books, and seeing movies also nourish my spirit. My husband and I enjoy playing cards and dominoes and putting together jigsaw puzzles.

What shall I call your husband? Pastor Tom.

What are some things that irritate you? 1) When someone is upset with me, but goes to someone else to talk about it. Please speak with me directly if you are bothered by something I have said or done. 2) When I am not told about a hospitalization — if I don't know, I can't visit. 3) When people do not follow through on what they said they would do. It is important to say "no" to some things so that we can do those things to which we have said "yes".

What are some of your personality quirks? I have a bit of Upper Midwestern reserve, so at times I am quiet and slow to reveal what I am thinking. Sometimes, when dealing with numbers, my brain and my mouth don't match up and I misspeak a number by a factor of 10. Please correct me. Also, I can be very task oriented. So, if I am preparing for worship, I may forget anything you tell me that is not related to the worship service. If you want me to remember it, write it on a piece of paper and hand the paper to me. The other personality quirk is that I tend to ramble when I speak: I will use 20 words when ten or less would have been enough. Please forgive me when I fail to get to the point.


Saturday, July 6 and Sunday, July 7




FOR CASEYVILLE ELEMENTARY





Building with Faith

Faith in Action Offers Nourishment and Shelter for Care Receivers

"It is like a grain of mustard seed, which ... when it is sown, it grows up and becomes larger than all the garden plants and puts out large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

(Mark 4:31-32)

In the parable of the mustard seed, Jesus tells us that if we work hard, we can see the fruit of our labors grow into a large plant that nourishes and shelters all of us. So it is with Collinsville *Faith in Action*. At its inception in 1998, CFIA followed the basic premise of providing volunteers to help seniors 60 years and older and adults with disabilities in Collinsville, Caseyville, Maryville, and State Park with door-to-door, no-cost services such as transportation to medical appointments, supermarkets, drugstores, banks, and more. CFIA grew in 2004 with the addition of a trained specialist providing the Answers on Aging program to help care receivers with the latest information on benefits and resources. Then in late 2008, CFIA added an outreach coordinator and the Elder Connection program was initiated in 2009 to offer care receivers opportunities for social outings to local restaurants and attractions.

In 2015, CFIA moved into larger new offices and flourished in its mission to put our faith into action to foster the independence of our care receivers. Today, with the help and support of our partner churches, *Faith in Action* is in the process of purchasing and renovating our offices and investigating the expansion of services for the future. Our partner churches are also the vital source of referral for care receivers and volunteers. If you feel someone could benefit from *Faith in Action* as a care receiver, call the CFIA office at 344-8080. And if you're willing and able, call the office and sign up as a volunteer to carry on the legacy of all the selfless volunteers who have preceded you.

HELP NEEDED

Maryville Outreach Center

Both the Food Pantry and Grandma's Attic need more volunteers. The Food Pantry is open Tuesday evenings from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm and Thursday and Saturday mornings from 10:00 am – 12:00 pm. In the Pantry, volunteers hand out food to clients, sort canned goods and restock shelves. At Grandma's Attic the hours they are open are Tuesday's 5:30-7:30 Wednesdays and Thursdays 10:00-1:00 and Saturdays 10:00-12:00. They need help sorting clothes and various donations, restocking shelves and sales. Please let the church office know if you are willing to help or call **Carol Orr**.

The Food Pantry helps families and elderly clients twice a month. Clients are eligible to receive canned goods, hamburger or chicken, paper goods (toilet paper, tissue paper), and personal care items such as shampoo and soap, cleaning products, milk and juice, bread and sweets, laundry detergent, and even pet food when available.

The Resident Assistance Program (RAP) helped one client in April with their Ameren bill.

Grandma's Attic continues to do a brisk business. The money taken in by the Attic is used to fund the Pantry and the RAP and pay for operating costs.

BISHOP S. JOHN ROTH WRITES...

At our recently concluded Synod Assembly, attendees raised the question of how we might assist humanitarian assistance to refugees and asylum seekers (asylees) in these days of crying need. **Refugees** are individuals who are forced to flee their countries of origin because of a well-founded fear of persecution due to race, religion, nationality, or membership in a particular social or pollical group. **Asylees** are people already in the U.S.A. who receive protected status and are unable to return home for the same reasons that refugees are unable to return home. Here is one relevant option.

The Bishop spoke with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services 9LIRS) at the Assembly. In the US Southwest, LIRS works with Lutheran Family Services-Rocky Mountains (LFSRM) for resettlement of refugees. LFSRM Refugee & Asylee Programs have helped people who have been uprooted by persecution and violence work towards self-sufficiency through essential resettlement services, including: housing, employment, English language, and cultural orientation.

So far this year, churches, civic organizations, businesses, community groups, and individuals have made it possible for LIRS and LFSRM to assist 10,000 people seeking to reunite with unaccompanied children, to help 250 unaccompanied children find caring foster homes, to welcome 1500 refugees and SIV (Special Immigrant Visa) holders, and now to provide immediate care to thousands of migrants released in central New Mexico by immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and Customs and Border Protection (CBP) in the form of food, clothing, orientation to available, overnight accommodations, and facilitating travel arrangements for those going elsewhere to connect with friends, or relatives. With ICE and CBP buses of migrants arriving weekly, the need continues.

To help financially in this humanitarian work, you may donate directly to LIRS or LFSRM, or you may send your donation to the C/SIS and we will forwards it to LIRS or LFSRM.

This year's Central/Southern Illinois Synod Assembly took place in Springfield, Illinois, from Thursday, June 6, through Saturday, June 8. 292 individuals attended this event, including Deanne Holshouser, Anita Steinmann, Marian Steinmann (youth delegate), and myself.

In addition to a few minor by-law changes, the majority of the discussion at the assembly centered around Bishop Roth's report he prepared after returning from his recent sabbatical. In his report, Bishop Roth identified eight technical challenges for the near future. These challenges, where resources to address them are already available, included multi-congregational parishes, measures of congregational vitality, and better utilization of synodically authorized ministers.

More discussion, however, took place on three adaptive challenges identified by Bishop Roth. With adaptive challenges, resources to address them are not readily available. Adaptive Challenge #1 addresses necessary adjustments as the conventional paradigm for ordained ministry diminishes. Adaptive Challenge #2 addresses the attraction and preparation of pastors and deacons willing to invest themselves in declining situations. Adaptive Challenge #3 is for congregations and clergy to remain God-centered as we struggle to address both technical and adaptive challenges. On a lighter note, our synod is considering a change to its name. Since 1988, when the ELCA came into being, our synod has been assigned the name Central/Southern Illinois Synod. This name has proved to be both awkward and confusing. Recommended changes were submitted at the assembly - it is very possible we could have a new synod name by the end of 2019. Since I know many of you cannot wait to hear our new name, I will be sure to pass it along as soon as I find out!


