I chose "Father Time" with his hourglass in one hand and a clock in the other. Like Santa he has a large bag of presents at his feet. Time is a gift. 

DEAR CHURCH:

A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S. by Lenny Duncan. Published by Fortress Press, July, 2019

Join in a discussion of the book *Dear Church*. The discussion group will start on January 23 and meet for one hour at <u>7 pm</u> each Thursday evening at Recess Brewing, 307 N. Main St., Edwardsville, IL 62025. Discussion will be facilitated by Pastor Tom Kratzer. All are welcome. Contact the church office (618.345.5692) to arrange for ordering a book. The Fortress Press description of the book is copied below.

"Lenny Duncan is the unlikeliest of pastors. Formerly incarcerated, he is now a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the United States: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Shifting demographics and shrinking congregations make all the headlines, but Duncan sees something else at work—drawing a direct line between the church's lack of diversity and the church's lack of vitality. The problems the ELCA faces are theological, not sociological. But so are the answers.

Part manifesto, part confession, and all love letter, *Dear Church* offers a bold new vision for the future of Duncan's denomination and the broader mainline Christian community of faith. *Dear Church* rejects the narrative of church decline and calls everyone — leaders and laity alike — to the front lines of the church's renewal through racial equality and justice.

It is time for the church to rise up, dust itself off, and take on forces of this world that act against God: whiteness, misogyny, nationalism, homophobia, and economic injustice. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the













DIRECTOR'S CORNER

At the Visioning for the Future of Worship sessions in the fall, participants wrote down the elements of worship that they find most meaningful or most important for them personally. Participants could list more than one element of worship. From approximately thirty-five people, the musical aspects of worship were named 27 times. The list of words named by participants included "music," "soloists," "instrumental music," "choir," "bells," and "lively praise music". 10 participants raised up the importance of "Church family". Being with one another matters in worship. "Scripture" was named four times. "Sermon" was named four times. And "Communion" was also named multiple times. Other elements that group member highly value are "joy," "love," "acceptance," "contemplation," "use of liturgy of grace and forgiveness," "new hymns and songs," "drama and dramatization," "mission work," "use of youth in worship," and "Saturday option instead of just Sunday".

A group of about ten people will soon begin the 3-session book study on "The Art of Curating Worship". As the group learns together they will keep in mind what gives meaning to worship for our members at OLLC. They will also explore some ideas that were raised by the participants including try different styles of worship such as Taizé, have musicians play off-site, intercessory prayer circles during worship, start a children's choir, have more 20-and-30-somethings lead worship, record faith stories from our members for the Website, lecture series explaining how the ELCA is different from other denominations, add drama to worship, have a paid SATB Quartet to enhance the OLLC choir, more interaction between all three services, teach the service during the service itself, events that explain the seasons of the church year, small groups for adults, more activities for youth, Sunday night service, full year kids program, fund a marketing and PR plan, more opportunities to do good with no strings attached, Live Stream services and events. As you can see from the list, participants were thinking of worship in a very wholistic sense. While we cannot implement every idea, the book study group will plan several worship events – some of which will take place off-site, others on our OLLC campus – for the year 2020. Please pray for the group as we follow the leading of the Holy Spirit into the unknown as we are called to design and enhance spiritual experiences for Our Lord's and beyond.



I want to thank the volunteers who helped in the Christmas Store as well as the congregation and visitors for all their support.




