JANUARY SERVICES

The Year of Mark

Many of our Gospel readings in worship will come from Mark this year. The Gospel of Mark is ancient. Yet, since readers still find it relevant, we sometimes forget that it was written in Greek around the year 70 C.E. The world it was composed for was an oral world. Often this book was read out loud to groups gathered around the storyteller. Very few copies of it existed and those were handwritten. So, people did not sit and read it silently.

The Gospel of Mark was written somewhere in the Mediterranean world and combines stories of and about Jesus. It is not an objective account of the historical Jesus. Those who have already been persuaded by the good news of and about Jesus are telling this story to persuade others. It is a story of people in conversation with God. It is a story of those who speak for God in conversation with those who are listening for God. The settings, characters, plot, and rhetoric give us a narrative with rich theological dimensions.

Although my favorite Bible story comes from the Gospel of Luke, my favorite Gospel is Mark. It is fast paced, has dramatic contrasts, nestles stories inside of other stories, and moves from one scene to another abruptly and with little commentary. One of my seminary professors memorized the whole thing and told it to us. We got to hear it in one sitting. Mark wants us to hear. He wants us to hear who Jesus really is. He wants us to understand so that our lives may be transformed by the one who gave his life for us.

> Jesus gave his life for us when he came to earth as a vulnerable human being. He emptied himself of his heavenly status and became humble. Then, walking among us, he learned how to form a community that shared its thoughts and struggles, hopes and dreams. So, this month, while the

weather outside is frightful, pick up the Gospel of Mark. Read it from beginning to end, and pay special attention to those disciples of his. Learn from them how to listen to Jesus. Learn from them how to be drawn into a small group that opens you to new relationships and shapes your life.

No matter how young or how old you are, Jesus is always ready to teach us something new.



Getting to Know Olivia Cross, OLLC Administrative Assistant

What is your favorite place on earth? For my previous job, I traveled to conventions quite frequently. In 2018, I got to visit New Zealand for over a week for a convention. While I was there, I visited the movie site for Lord of the Rings. Most of my childhood was spent reading these books with my dad, watching these movies with my family on sick days, and pretending to be characters from these movies. I went on all sorts of adventures as Frodo! Visiting the spot where these stories came to life was incredible – it was a beautiful day in every way. The landscapes of New Zealand are incredible – there are vast forests of pine trees covering every mountain, flowers constantly blooming in every yard, and it was sunny every single day I was there! I've attached a few pictures I took of the site I visited – I'll never forget it!





What do you like to do for fun? In my spare time, I raise a variety of tropical plants! When the pandemic began, I felt very disconnected from nature, so I decided to bring it into my house! Owning plants is a different type of "ownership," it's not like buying an object from a store. We are used to driving everywhere, as my sister's wheelchair is not easy to get through airport security!

What is your work history? I have a degree in music theory from the University of Missouri, Saint Louis. I used that to teach voice and piano for several years during my undergraduate degree, as well as immediately after graduation. I also sang in several paid ensembles on a regular basis before the pandemic began, and hope to sing regularly at Our Lord's in the future! I worked at Opera Theatre Saint Louis on Front of House staff for many years (and hope to continue to do so seasonally once inperson performances resume), and also have worked at the Repertory Theatre of Saint Louis on the Box Office staff. For the past 3 years, I worked in customer service, sales, and office management for STL Ocarina – a small business located in St Louis Missouri. They design and produce musical instruments called Ocarinas, which are extremely popular in schools as an alternative to the recorder!

What is your favorite book? I have many! My mother has another degree in English literature, so she made sure to give me many amazing books from an early age! My father also has excellent taste in fantasy and sci fi, so he started me on the Chronicles of Narnia, the Lord of the Rings, and many other fantastic series as soon as I was old enough to read. I would have to say that one of my favorite books is the novel *Phantastes* by George MacDonald – I wrote my college entrance essay for UMSL on this book.





"Journeys With Angels" by Christa von Zychlin

The Bible features numerous encounters with angels who show up on an array of missions, from wielding a sword (Genesis 3:24), to rescuing a child (Genesis 22:11-12), to a mass choir singing, "Glory to God in the highest" (Luke 2:14). Angels are not a major focus of holy Scripture, nor are they ever mentioned in our Christian creeds. Yet they show up with frequently and at pivotal moments in both Old and New Testaments. Church Reformer Martin Luther is quoted as saying, "If you picture the Bible to be a mighty tree and every word a little branch, I have shaken every one of these branches because I wanted to know what it was and what it meant." In Winter 2021, the Rev. Christa von Zychlin will present the four-part study "Journeys with angels" in which we will shake those biblical branches, watch for angels and listen for God's calls to action. Session topics:

January: Looking up—New beginnings, awe-full, awesome angels February: Repentance and route-changing angels March: Loneliness, abandonment and holy comfort April: Feasting angels

FAITH IN ACTION

Lesson Learned

Greetings to all as the new year begins. Many of us are happy to see 2020 in the rearview mirror, and I'm certain most of us are feeling at least somewhat optimistic for the coming year. As we begin to pack up the holiday decorations and start working on our resolutions for the future, let's look back to one story of 2020.

Joannie (not her real name) is a single mother to an adult child with disabilities. Joannie is sharp, dedicated to her son's well-being, and on a limited income. She called in the summer of 2020 when she wanted to apply for a discounted rate on her license plate sticker. I was the new Answers on Aging Specialist at CFIA and had been zipping through other online applications for many of our clients, but Joannie's case was different.

Because of her enrollment in some of the state's systems to assist people with disabilities, Joannie had been denied the discount on her license plate sticker. She was ready to try again, and I was highly motivated by my previous successes with other clients. It didn't take long to hit our first obstacles in the online application, but together, we kept at it and called the state repeatedly with each denial of this benefit. Soon we were referred to the Social Security offices because Joannie's son was receiving benefits. We were required to contact her bank and provide documentation well beyond the usual requirements.

As the weeks went on, Joannie taught me a powerful lesson: *together we were better*. She patiently explained her situation to me, and we continued to work through multiple agencies. There were days that we wanted to give up, but we held each other up and persevered. One day, in the heat of the summer, she mentioned that her air conditioning had broken down. Her house was sweltering, so she prioritized keeping her son safe by finding a way to fix that air conditioning.

After months of trying, we finally connected to a state employee who helped us put all the paperwork in order. Joannie was approved for the discount, and we celebrated together. It may seem a small victory, but the experience we shared was my introduction to the mission of CFIA. We coordinate with churches and agencies to serve the people in our community. The year 2020 was challenging in so many ways, but I've learned that **united together**, **we can make a difference**. Please join us in 2021: volunteer to work with clients, send us your prayers, contribute monetarily or with your skills. Together we will continue putting our faith into action.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

On August 4, 2020, a devastating ammonium nitrate explosion rocked the port of Beirut, killing almost 200 people, injuring more than 6,000, and displacing an astonishing 300,000. On top of the deep human impact, Lutheran World Relief learned that three containers of quilts and kits had been awaiting clearance in the port at the time of the blast.

They were originally told the shipment was lost, and it was news that stung. Hours of time, investments of finances, and thousands of prayers were wrapped up in the 22,500 quilts, 3,500 school kits, 19,500 personal care kits, and 2,250 baby care kits included in those three containers. As they shared our collective grief over this whole situation, they also heard: we will keep going. One quilter said, "Good thing I just oiled my sewing machine." This response, borne out of a deep place of faithfulness and fueled by the love imprinted on hearts by our Creator, was and remains a light in the darkness.

On August 26, LWR staff received an urgent communication from their partners on the ground in Beirut: they finally got access to the port. It appeared at first glance that the three containers were in the one place in the port that provided some small amount of protection from the blast. The containers were damaged — but not completely destroyed, as initially believed. After two weeks of sorting and checking for damage and contamination, nearly the entire shipment was cleared and available for distribution, not only to the originally intended recipients but to people in Beirut who were directly impacted by the blast. Indeed, the discovery that the love of Lutherans would be able to reach our neighbors in Beirut through the thousands of quilts and kits is "a garland instead of ashes" (v3). In the midst of heartache and disaster, good news was delivered to both the people of Beirut and to those in the U.S. whose love would still be shared.



Hope for Stability and Safety

South Carolina

Manhal says that the day in June 2009 when Lutheran Services Carolinas (LSC) met him at the airport was the best day of his life. A refugee from Iraq, Manhal says he realized that starting over wouldn't be easy, but with hard work he's forged a career for himself in the Columbia hospitality industry. He began his hotel career doing things that no one really enjoys, like cleaning bathrooms. Some days, he said, he'd go home and cry. But he never doubted that he could make something of himself. Within a year and a half he was promoted to supervisor, and later, he earned his current job as a manager. Manhal is not alone in his success. Dylan Gunnels, a job recruiter for LSC's refugee services program, explained that 96% of LSC's refugee clients in the Columbia area become self-sufficient within the first 180 days of arriving in this country, which means they are getting and maintaining jobs and able to cover their expenses. In the long term, Gunnels said, studies have shown that refugees will eventually contribute more in taxes than they received in relocation benefits and other public assistance. Manhal already has a good hotel job but says he hasn't achieved all of his goals — he aspires to be a general manager one day. "I will never stop dreaming about my future," he said. Gifts to ELCA World Hunger have supported Lutheran Services Carolinas and other ministries as they provide support for refugees who are working to build a new life in a new home.

Hope for Creative and Courageous Leadership

California

For Jamie Stark, a lay mission developer in the Bay Area of California, that call to play a role in God's plan began when he first learned about Holy Communion and the idea of "food as a gateway to God." Inspired by the work he saw in El Salvador, Jamie moved to the Bay Area and cofounded Farming Hope, a farm-to-table job-training nonprofit organization, which is supported by ELCA World Hunger and the Sierra Pacific Synod of the ELCA.

Farming Hope provides transitional employment and job training to unhoused and low income people in the community. As part of the program, participants learn to farm, grow and cook food — job skills and life skills that can help them earn a living to support themselves and their families. Farming Hope works with hiring partners to hire graduates of the program after they complete it. Farming Hope might not look like a church, but as Jamie describes it, "it is a holy place," a place where relationships are formed and community is nurtured while basic vocational needs are met.

Jamie's vision of food as a gateway to God and the restoration of relationships that God intends is at the core of Farming Hope's work. "When I sit at the table at Farming Hope's restaurant in San Francisco (Manny's), if I open my eyes, I see communion exactly as Jesus of Nazareth intended it to be — friends, eating intentionally ... we're all welcome." For Jamie, seeing Holy Communion for what it was — a table at which all are welcome — and being inspired by the work he witnessed in El Salvador fostered hope that, by focusing on relationships built through food, Farming Hope could create opportunities for both jobs and community in San Francisco.



PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

More and more congregations, and ministries are being targeted by scammers and phishing attacks. These emails or text messages often pretend they are a pastor or bishop and ask for private conversation, or to ask for a favor, or to purchase gift cards. These attacks are a phishing or spoofing scam. This means that the email account or phone number has probably NOT been hacked. Attackers are using an alternate email address or phone number and contacts found using A.I. software. This kind of attack is often called CEO Phishing or Business Email Compromise. In 2019, the FBI reported that this is a \$26 billion scam.




