

UNANTICIPATED TECH EXPENSES

On March 16, 2020, a long-term goal to livestream our worship services at Our Lord's suddenly became a two-day challenge. Thanks to the efforts of individuals like Matt Gross, Patrick Noga, Tim Nyland, Brian Gunderson, Randy Kampwerth, and Pastor Darla Ann, we were able to livestream the Lenten Holden service on Wednesday, March 18. In preparation for the first weekend of livestreaming, others such as Harvey Chiles, Loretta Williams, Steve Hoelscher, Linda Eakin, Katie Noga, Roberta Maue, and Jeff Waterman also contributed. Ed Foppe is currently working with this project as well.

This recent move to bring worship services into our own homes has nevertheless been costly. It is expected we will surpass our annual IT budget of \$2500 on equipment such as a personal computer, cameras, microphones, cables, and audio headsets. Right now, we project to spend approximately \$3500, but additional purchases may be necessary to improve the overall video or audio quality. If interested and willing to help offset the costs of "going live", please consider a small monetary gift to Our Lord's. Be sure to write "IT" or "Tech" in the memo line.

Thank you for your patience as the IT Ministry Team continually tries to improve the virtual worship experience during these unusual times! Once we are fully operational, this will be a worship feature that will benefit our members, especially shut-ins, for years to come.

2020 Census FAQ

What is the census?

The census is a count of every person who lives in the United States and its territories. It happens every 10 years. In early 2020, you will be asked to count everyone who lives in your home as of April 1. Responding to the 2020 Census is a chance to shape your future.

What's in it for me?



Your responses inform where over \$675 billion is distributed each year to communities nationwide for clinics, schools, roads, and more.



Census data gives community leaders vital information to make decisions about building community centers, opening businesses, and planning for the future.



Responding also fulfills your civic duty because it's mandated by the U.S. Constitution. The United States has counted its population every 10 years since 1790.



Your responses are used to redraw legislative districts and determine the number of seats your state has in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Is my information safe?

Your responses to the 2020 Census are safe, secure, and protected by federal law. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics. They cannot be used against you by any government agency or court in any way—not by the FBI, not by the CIA, not by the DHS, and not by ICE.

When can I respond to the census?

In early 2020, every household in America will receive a notice to complete the census online, by phone, or by mail. In May, the U.S. Census Bureau will begin following up in person with households that have yet to respond.

What will I be asked?

You will be asked a few simple questions, like age, sex, and the number of people who live in your home, including children.

What won't be asked?

The census will never ask for Social Security numbers, bank or credit card numbers, money or donations, or anything related to political parties.



Tips to Spot Census Scams

- Census Activity will take place via **Mail**, and/or **door-to-door** activity.
- The Census Bureau may invite you to complete your Census Questionnaire online. **Your invitation** to do so will be given through the **US MAIL**;
- Census workers SHOULD NOT ask for your Social Security Number, Banking information, Credit Card Numbers or other account numbers;
- Census workers SHOULD NOT ask when household members leave for or return from work;
- Census workers SHOULD NOT ask you to make a donation;
- Census workers SHOULD NOT ask you to support a political party;
- Census workers SHOULD NOT threaten jail time as a means to make you complete the Census;
- The Census Bureau WILL NOT be communicating with households via e-mail.
- If a Census worker shows up at your door, they should be able to show you a valid ID that verifies them as a census worker, including their name, photograph and a watermark showing that they work for the Department of Commerce.
- Legitimate Census correspondence should have a return address from Jeffersonville, IN, the site of the National Census Processing Center.
- Don't trust caller ID— scammers can use 'spoofing' tools to make it appear as though they are calling from the real Census Bureau. Instead, if you have any questions, you can call the Census Bureau National Processing Center at 1-800-523-3205, 1-800-642-0469 or 1-800-877-8339 (TDD/TTY) to verify legitimate Census Bureau Activity.



Why is the Census Important?

- It gives the government an accurate count of everyone living in the U.S.
- The Constitution directs a census be conducted every 10 years
- It determines how the U.S. Government distributes over \$675 BILLION to the 50 states and territories for vital programs
- It is estimated that for every Illinois resident NOT COUNTED, Illinois loses \$2,000 in funds per person
- The Census determines fair representation in the House of Representatives
- Census information helps lawmakers determine legislative boundaries
- Census information helps determine funding for Energy Assistance, the Community Development Block Grant, HOME Program, funding for hospitals, and other local funds

Follow the stay home order and do not leave your home to purchase supplies!




