

ONLINE WORSHIP MINISTRY

During the second half of March and the first two weeks of April, the portion of the IT Team that I now refer to as our Streaming Team, livestreamed multiple services each week. Mid-week Lenten Holden Evening Prayer was already underway when streaming began. Our team handled that and the Holy Week services on top of providing two services a weekend. It was a huge effort and I am so thankful for their expertise and persistence.

I made the decision to protect the health of our volunteer Streaming Team by reducing the number of worship services to one each weekend. Easter 6 – John 14:15-21 "Sending an Advocate"


May 23 & 24 - Organ, piano, and Cantor

Each weekend the worship service will be available for viewing by 5 pm. When it is a Praise Band led service, it will usually be livestreamed. When it is the musical style supported by organ, piano, and cantor, it will usually be pre-recorded and available for those who worship at 5 pm, 8 am, 10:45 am and anytime in-between or after. It is wonderful knowing so many of us are singing and praying at the same time from our homes. It is also wonderful to have the option of worshiping at another time. Even when we are able to return to our Worship Center, the livestreaming of one weekend worship service will continue.

SING, SING, SING

If your need is greater than what is in the Blessing Box, you may call the Food Pantry and make arrangements to meet with the Food Pantry director. If you need help through the Residence Assistant Program, you may also leave a message for that.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) is responding to this pandemic here in the United States and around the world, including:

- Across the United States, LDR is providing support for ELCA World Hunger's Daily Bread grants, which
 are supporting congregational feeding ministries as they do the critical work of providing those who
 are in need in their communities with food.
- In New Orleans, LDR is aiding the expansion of Bethlehem Lutheran Church's community meal program, which targets the at-risk population who are impacted at this time.
- In Southern California, LDR is supporting Care Connection Network, a social ministry organization, to serve older adults and people who are home bound by delivering food and essential supplies, in collaboration with congregations in the Pacifica Synod.
- In China, we helped provide medical supplies including ventilators, protective face shields, disposable gloves and more, as well as daily necessities such as food.
- In Italy, through the ELCA's companion church, the Chiesa Evangelica Luterana in Italia, LDR is providing Betania Evangelical Hospital in Naples, Italy, with support and medical gear and supplies.
- In Palestine, LDR is working with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jerusalem and the Holy Land to provide food and necessities to families whose livelihoods have been impacted.
- In Sierra Leone, we are supporting the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sierra Leone so the church can participate in a national response plan with the government.

LDR is also working with the Lutheran World Federation and the ACT Alliance to support their global responses.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"The risen Christ, who walks on wounded feet from garden tomb through darkened city street, unlocks the door of grief, despair, and fear, and speaks a word of peace to all who hear."

ELW Hymn #390

In this season of Easter we are watching the pandemic spread across the globe, darkening city streets, emptying village market places, and straining resources, including the most important resource of all -people. The novel virus causing all this upheaval is still something of an unknown character. Each week researchers learn a bit more about its traits and its spread. We have learned that it had arrived in many nations and states far earlier than we knew. The percentage of people with no symptoms is much higher than with other viral diseases such as the flu. And the incubation time after exposure can be as long as fourteen days. These, and things that may be learned in the future, all affect returning to church.

Communities of faith have both additional freedoms and additional responsibilities. Even when the stay-at-home order is lifted, we will seek guidance from public health experts and denominational leaders. I am reminded of words written by the apostle Paul to the faith community at Corinth: "All things are lawful," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful," but not all things build up. Do not seek your own advantage, but that of the other. (1 Corinthians 10:23-24, NRSV)

We are resetting our expectations, not just of when, but of how we will return to our physical spaces for worship, learning, serving, and connecting. We know now we won't be starting with a big celebratory homecoming. Instead return will have to happen in stages. And, we may have to move back and forth between those stages if there are second or third waves of infections.

So, for now we will continue to have online worship services only. There is more information about those, and what style of worship will be offered each weekend, on the next page. Bible studies, discussion groups, meetings, and the High School Sunday School class have begun to meet online. See page 5 for more information. Minimal, drop-in staffing is being used for essential operations. (Those in the office are wearing masks.) The rest of the time, your church staff is working from home.

Elsewhere in this newsletter there is information about plans for social hours via Zoom, summer services held in the Chapel in the Pines, and other ways to continue to be the body of Christ in this place and time. Speaking a word of peace, the peace given to us by our risen Lord, is one to encourage one another. May that peace sustain you and fill you with hope and joy.

ADVICE FOR A TIME OF PLAGUE

Here is the quote Pastor Kratzer shared at the worship service on the last weekend of April. Martin Luther wrote this advice to his good friend and colleague, The Rev. Dr. John Hess, in response to his questions on how to act in a time of plague almost 500 years ago.

"I shall ask God mercifully to protect us. Then I shall fumigate, help purify the air, administer medicine and take it. I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance inflict and pollute others and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me and I have done what he has expected of me and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbor needs me however I shall not avoid place or person but will go freely as stated above. See this is such a God-fearing faith because it is neither brash nor foolhardy and does not tempt God."

I have been Our Lord's Lutheran Church Secretary and Administrative Assistant for exactly 22 years, beginning on April 20, 1998 until April 20, 2020. I was "called" to this position, just like a person is called to be a pastor. It took three times for the Holy Spirit's call to me to get my resume in before I actually listened and followed through. My first day at Our Lord's was also the day that I found out that my other employer, Venture Discount Stores, announced they were declaring bankruptcy. My Venture co-workers told me, "God certainly had a plan for you!" And God shows me all the time, the He DOES have a plan for me. I just need to listen!

I have worked with five pastors at Our Lord's, three permanent pastors and two interims, as well as five vicars, and a whole host of supply pastors through the years. I have learned from them all. My previous, non-church related jobs, were a training ground for what I would face as an Administrative Assistant. I became a "social worker" for people who needed help or referrals, I became God's sales person when showing potential members or visitors around, I have been God's assistant cook as I made a sandwich for someone who was hungry, I channeled my experiences as teacher, trainer or consultant as I tried to listen with God's ears to someone lost or confused or needing something that often they didn't even know they needed or brainstormed solutions to problems. And my years in government work prepared me for the mountain of paperwork, bulletins, record keeping and deadlines. And in all of that God was leading me and I was trying to follow. The last few years, I stretched my faith even more by helping to plan worship, write prayers and try to keep the day to day office activities going while we were without a pastor.

And when retirement approached, the Holy Spirit told me I had to wait, I couldn't retire yet. That I need to stay with Our Lord's until we had a permanent pastor in place and then give that person 6-8 months before I could retire. I agreed although reluctantly, until I came to accept that it wasn't quite time for me to retire yet. I followed.

So I would like to thank the people of Our Lord's for giving me 22 years of the most satisfying, gratifying and challenging job that I ever had. Your continued kindness, tolerance, love and caring have touched me greatly. I will miss being there for you just as you have been there for me. But I am looking forward to my retirement and am curious to see where the Holy Spirit leads me next. And I will do my best to follow.


