ASH WEDNESDAY & ASHES TO GO




Ash Wednesday Schedule:

Ashes To Go **7:30 am - 8:30 am** - WC Ashes To Go **11:30 am - 1:30 pm** - WC Ashes To Go **4:30 pm - 6:00 pm** - WC Ash Wednesday Service **7 pm** - Livestream On Ash Wednesday, Christians around the world have the sign of the cross marked on their foreheads with ashes. A drive-up option where Pastor Kratzer uses a long handled cotton swab to mark your forehead will be at the times listed here. The other option is to pick up a container of ashes and self-impose them at home. This may be done during the livestreamed worship service at 7:00 pm on Wednesday, February 17, or during an at home ritual that will be described in a page sent out by the office.

THE CHURCH'S NEW HERE WE STAND MOMENT -

A discussion opportunity

"Here I stand. I can do no other." Luther said these words in 1521 at the Diet (assembly) of Worms.[i]

Lutheran theologian, Anna Madsen, invites us to consider The Church's New Here We Stand Moment in her recent book, I Can Do No Other. Madsen's "book is born out of the conviction that at least two gods are currently competing for our collective trust: nationalism (and its many sub-manifestations) and quietism. Both make a case for and a claim on our allegiance, each by way of different motivations of self and institutional protection. Madsen looks at today's modern context and asks: Where will the church stand in a day that is marked by globalization, polarization, racism, bigotry, and debates about justice for humanity and for the earth itself. While the Reformation church was built on the foundation of justification by grace, Madsen calls people of faith to a new reformation that will focus on standing for justice in the world. Madsen delves into who Jesus was, and how our claim that he died and was raised establishes our faith and impacts the way we live it out. She pays attention to Luther's theology and juxtaposes it with our present context. She explores recent examples of Nazi resistance, liberation theology, black and womanist theology, and feminist theology, each of which come at social justice in their unique ways, with a common conviction that justice work is central to the Christian life. She speaks of how our faith grounding and our faith history weave together and entwine themselves into our present moment, offering both warnings and encouragement. And last, a case is made that justice, anchored in justification, is our new Reformation moment, one not inconsistent with Luther's theology, but weighted differently to address the different weighty concerns of our day. A study guide is included to encourage group conversation and action." (from the Fortress Press website)

Please join us for what should be an interesting discussion. We will meet (via Zoom) at 10 am on Tuesdays starting on February 23rd. LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Supporting Neighbors After Disaster Daudi Msseemmaa, ELCA regional representative for East Africa

An earthquake, mass displacement, low-latitude tropical cyclones, COVID-19, a plague of locusts - 2020 has been a year of calamities in East Africa like no other. Among the most destructive and widespread for ELCA companions in the region was flooding. In Rundugai, Tanzania, the water came quickly. The water rose suddenly on the savanna, soaking the earthen walls of people's homes and soon washing away goats, cows, and even houses. In the hours and days after, people who lost everything needed shelter, food, and hugs. External support became essential - relieving pressure on neighbors and relatives who gave their all helping the most stricken.

Members of the local church in Rundugai went to every household in the parish to conduct an assessment and determine who most critically needed support. The local church appealed to the district church office. A week after the flood, they sent over 14,000 pounds of maize and 1,700 pounds of beans. Through Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR), the church funded relief in the Northern Diocese as well as five others. Roads and boats were used to reach the most distressed, who often are women, children, and people with disabilities. The church distributed food and non-food items and offered training on hygiene practices to those sheltering in schools that had been closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

LDR support comes alongside the dignified work that is already in place - that of neighbors helping neighbors in crisis. In our vision of accompaniment, the ELCA lives into its role as a companion when it walks alongside brothers and sisters in their moment of need, stands with them in prayer, and remains hopeful of what arises out of disaster.

STORIES FROM ELCA WORLD HUNGER RELIEF



Girls In Colombia Become Advocates For Themselves And Others

Bogata, Colombia

Learning about the rights of girls and women has inspired 11 year old Danna to become an advocate for herself and her friends. In the Bosa-Porvenir neighborhood, south of Bogata, Colombia, high rates of unemployment and low levels of education can combine to produce stressful family environments, where children may be at risk of being mistreated. The Projecting My Future Young Women in Marginalized Communities workshops aim to disrupt these cycles, training young women to speak out against and report situations of violence, and helping them improve their self-confidence and relationships with the people around them.

Danna says that learning about women's rights in these workshops helped her go from being shy to being confident on issues she cares about. She liked the subject so much that one day last year she asked her teacher's permission to speak and tell all her classmates about the importance of the rights of women and girls. Danna says she now knows how to face life more safely with her friends, neighbors, family, and schoolmates, believing all girls should know how to advocate for themselves in situations of violence or abuse.

Adapting To Support Children In Romania During COVID-19

Sibiu, Romania

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, Open House Day Center in Sibiu, Romania, was among schools and day cares around the world that had to close their doors. But thanks to your support and the ingenuity of its staff, the children it serves know they're not alone. And despite the closure, Monika, a social worker and project manager, has continued to stay in touch with all of the children and families the center serves. She and other social workers have delivered fresh food and hygiene items such as hand sanitizer, disinfectants, shower gel and toothpaste to the families. The social workers have also delivered worksheets, games, toys and painting materials so the kids could keep learning and stay busy while sheltering from home.

One of these children is Stefan, 8. Stefan lives with his grandfather and mother, who both have mental illnesses. Stefan likes to read about dinosaurs, animals and other science-related topics, and is known to withdraw into a book when the children he's playing with get too loud. The social workers describe Stefan as shy and say he interacts passively with the adults there, answers questions with a single word, and is difficult to engage in conversation.

One day, Stefan called the staff of the Open House Day Center to ask when he could come back. "The amazing thing for me was when I got a call from him one day," Monika said. "He took the initiative and called me. He wanted to know when he could return to the day center. He misses playing with the children, and he misses the food."


