PASTOR'S COLUMN

3 Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war rise up against me, yet I will continue to trust.

Can I really pray these verses with the Psalmist and mean it? It's much easier to pray the verse that follows verse 3:

4 One thing I asked of the Lord; this I seek: to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in his temple.

Psalm 27

These verses sit side by side during Lent while we are watching the suffering of so many people due to war. We see the burden of human violence. We feel sadness and exhaustion as people continue to feed the cycle of vengeance and violence. And in the face of that pain, we make our way toward the passion of our Lord Jesus Christ. We move back and forth "between what is happening in our violent world and what happens in the Bible as Christ moves toward Jerusalem and death." (Thomas Troeger) Christ leads us through the suffering and reconnects us to the heart of the God of love. Because God is love, we can trust that we will see the beauty of God – in glimpses while we live on earth, and in its fullness someday in the future. Hold the pain you feel close to the holy hope within you. Jesus will feed that hope and help us see beauty as we journey with him toward cross and resurrection.

MARCH GIVING EMPHASIS

Lutheran Social Services of Illinois

During the Season of Lent (March 5 to April 20) Our Lord's Lutheran Church will focus its Giving Emphasis toward Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI). LSSI is a non-profit social service organization connecting with Illinois residents through over 50 affiliations, accreditations, licensors, certifications and memberships.

Between July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023 LSSI was able to connect with 50,291 people in Illinois, that is 1 in every 252 people in the State. A snap-shot of some of the services provided by LSSI during that time include:

- Being the largest provider of foster care services in Illinois, LSSI was able to provide foster care placements for 2,607 children.
- LSSI enrolled 1,391 families in its Intact Family Services program designed to stabilize, strengthen, enhance, and preserve
- Critical mental health services were available for 15,352 individuals.
- 127 people aged 18+ with intellectual/developmental disabilities received guidance from LSSI to live successfully in their
- community.

 A total of 2,399 individuals with substance use disorders received various services, including DUI counseling and education, outpatient substance use treatment, and sober living programs.
- healthy start recovery homes, inpatient rehabilitation, outpatient substance use treatment, and sober living programs. 1,447 Illinois residents, aged 62+ or 18+ with disabilities, who earned between \$5,000 and \$25,000 annually, received offers for affordable housing at one of 20 housing sites throughout the state.

Donations assist LSSI to stay connected with Illinois residents and help them fulfill their Mission Statement of "Responding to the Gospel, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois brings healing, justice, and wholeness to people and communities."



God brings new life in unexpected ways and in the most unlikely situations. This devotional reflects on how God does this in the creation



of all things, the Israelites' rescue from slavery in Egypt, the dry bones and Ezekiel, the fiery furnace, the big fish and Jonah, and more. Life Renewed provides devotions for each day from Ash Wednesday to the Resurrection of Our Lord/ Vigil of Easter (March 5 to April 19, 2025). The devotions begin with evocative images and brief scripture readings drawn from traditional Easter Vigil texts. The writers then bring their diverse voices and pastoral wisdom to the texts with quotations to ponder, reflections, and prayers.

Celebrate the bold women in your life!



Olimpia Fulvia Morata (1526-1555), Italian scholar, poet, and writer who sought to advance the <u>Protestant</u> <u>Reformation</u> in <u>Italy</u>.



Argula von Grumbach (1492-1554), <u>Bavarian</u> writer and noblewoman who became involved in the <u>Protestant</u> <u>Reformation</u> debates in Germany. She became the first Protestant woman writer, publishing letters and poems promoting and defending <u>Martin Luther</u>.



Katharina Schütz Zell (1498–1562) a religious reformer who campaigned for the right of clergy to marry and the responsibility of lay people—women as well as men—to proclaim the Gospel. As one of the first and most daring models of the pastor's wife in the Protestant Reformation, she demonstrated that she could be an equal partner in marriage.



Katharina von Bora Luther (<u>|1499-1552</u>), a former nun who married <u>Martin Luther</u> in 1525. Katharina is recognized as the stabilizing force in Luther's life, enabling his later works.





Registration Open for Crossways Confirmation Camp June 9-13 at Augustana College

Crossways Confirmation Campers have the opportunity to grow in their discipleship journey by engaging in lessons, sermons, and Bible stories each day. Each year we visit the home of a faith tradition different than ours, and we tour a local agency doing God's work in the community.



This year's camp theme is #SPIRITSTRONG and will take place June 9-13 at Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill. Crossways Confirmation Camp is for confirmation-age students who have just completed 6th, 7th, or 8th grade. The registration fee for 2025 is \$350/person. The cost includes all meals while at camp, a t-shirt, our stay in the dorm, and all activities during the

Adult Faith Formation: Worship Starts March 29

What is worship? What is Lutheran worship? What is essential in worship? Why do we worship? Who do we worship? What goes into planning and leading a worship service? This course will focus on both the Biblical and theological backgrounds for worship, particularly the Sacraments, as well as providing opportunities for practical application.

The course will be taught primarily on Zoom; however, there will be one additional practicum session for those who have registered for credit — Synod-Authorized Ministry students. The date and location will be determined.

Each class will be divided into two parts: 1) background, Bible and theology of worship; and 2) practicum. The length of the parts may vary, but in general Part 1 will last two hours and Part 2 will take up the last hour. Those who register for credit will be expected to remain for the entire three hours. Non-credit auditors will attend only part 1. The exception is for the first class which will last for 3 hours for everyone.

The primary text for the class will be "Central Things — Worship in Word and Sacrament" by Gordon W. Lathrop. Additionally, everyone will also be expected to have a copy of Evangelical Lutheran Worship (the current cranberry red hymnal).

The spring Adult Faith Formation course on worship will be held starting at 9:00 a.m. on March 29, April 12, April 26, May 3, and May 17. The cost is \$25 for general learners and \$50 for Synod-Authorized Ministry students. Register at <u>CSIS-ELCA.org/aff25spring</u>.



The devotion was from Exodus:

"Moses said to the LORD, 'Pardon your servant, Lord. I have never been eloquent, neither in the past nor since you have spoken to your servant. I am slow of speech and tongue." Exodus 4:10 (NIV) The Lord replied with these powerful words:

"Who gave human beings their mouths? ... Now go; I will help you speak and will teach you what to say" Exodus 4:11-12, NIV).

God did more than answer Moses' doubt; He reassured Moses of who He was. Moses knew exactly what to say, knew what God planned to do, knew God would be with him. So what could hold him back when things seemed so very clear? It was the same thing that sometimes holds you and me back: Moses doubted God had created him for the calling God gave him.

- The balance of the Monthly Emphasis Fund at the end of January 2025 was \$265.53 (School Supplies \$190.53, Souper Bowl of Caring \$75.00).
- General Benevolence Income in January was \$81,299.50. \$7,326 (9% of GB giving) to CS/IS for Synod Benevolence for January.
- Local Benevolence for January totals \$814. In January, \$300 was given to the SIUE Foundation toward Cougar Cupboard, leaving a balance of \$514 (to be allocated in March).
- The Employee Retention Credit check for \$13,036.34 was credited to the Miscellaneous Pass-Through Fund. Of that total, \$5,953 was to pay for the records preparation. The remainder of \$7,083.34 was transferred to the General Fund for parking lot repair.
- 5.111.100 Maintenance reflects a charge of \$2,285 for snow removal in January.
